



Sex offender recidivism in Belgium: a state of affairs

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Introduction

- Preliminary results of WP2 SOC-project -> objectives
 - Analyze recidivism (prevalence, time to recidivism) of sex offenders, compared to non-sex offenders
 + among sex offenders (different types of sex offenders)
 - Identify static predictors of recidivism (of sex offenders) and assess the effects of sanction type/release modality
- Different databases
 - Conviction data (Central Criminal Registry) N = 136,530 persons
 - Prison data (SIDIS-Griffie prison database) N = 14,754 persons
 - Data of released sex offenders on mandatory treatment in the Walloon Region N = 342
- o Important remarks
 - Official data (different levels criminal justice system) \rightarrow 'selected' populations (~ selection processes)
 - 'Dark number' (offenders/offences not known to the police/judicial authorities) (cf. Farrington et al. 2013: self report vs. official data)
 - Absence of integrated criminal justice statistics/data(bases): lack of unique identifier, e.g. prison → conviction data
 - Official data: 'administrative' data limited information available

CONVICTION DATA

- Population under study: offenders convicted to a sentence/measure in 1995 Follow-up till 13 November 2013
- **Definition** 'sex offender'
 - Conviction for at least one sex offence in criminal record history (in 1995 and/or before)
 - First offenders: first conviction in 1995 + conviction for a sex offence

ALL	\rightarrow N = 136,530 of which 2,638 sex offenders (1.9%)
First-offenders	\rightarrow N = 67,272 of which 374 sex offenders (0.56%)

- Outcome measure: **reconviction** after (first) conviction in 1995
 - Irrespective of seriousness of index offence (non-sex offender group) and offence at time of reconviction
 - Irrespective of type/severity of sentence or measure imposed (index/reconviction)
 - Differences with respect to criminal record history (number of prior convictions) between the 2 groups

PRISON DATA

- Population under study: convicted offenders released from prison in 2003-2005 follow-up till 15 March 2017
- Definition 'sex offender': at least one sex offence in detention history (before release from prison in 2003-2005) → N = 14,754 of which 1,637 sex offenders (11.1%)
- Outcome measure = 're-incarceration' (new offence and/or parole violation)

Static risk factors

- Intrinsic negative influences of the sexual offender or in his life course with a role on the probability of recidivism
- Historic variables
- Unchangeable or less changeable even with psychological intervention
- Best predictors of recidivism including sexual recidivism
- (Andrews & Bonta, 2010; Cortoni, 2009)

Examples

- Age \rightarrow violent and general recidivism
- Criminal history: prior sex offences → sexual recidivism ; or general offences → violent and general recidivisms
- Age of the onset of the criminal career: juvenile delinquency → violent and general recidivisms
- Victims preferences: younger, unknown and male victims (deviant sexual interests) → sexual recidivism
- (Blokland & Van Der Geest, 2015; Hanson & Bussière, 1998; Hanson, 2002, Hanson, Morton, & Harris, 2003; Hanson & Yates, 2013; Harris & Rice, 2007)

Literature

Non-sexual recidivism is more frequent than sexual recidivism in a population of sex offenders

(Blokland & Van Der Geest, 2015)

Literature

Sample

- 342 released sex offenders in mandatory treatment in Walloon Region
- Age at release: M = 43,17 years; σ = 11,70; R = 14,27 79,22
- Period of release: M = 9,60 years; σ = 5,75; R = 0 25,08

Procedure

- Files consulted at the Ministry of Justice (Administration, Brussels) for collecting data on:
 - Criminal records
 - Types of recidivism
 - Risk static factors (age; marital status; victims;..) in order to score Static-99R and 2002R
- Based on the Project for the ongoing evaluation of the offense characteristics, diagnostic aspects, social environment and treatment of sex offenders by specialized healthcare teams in the Walloon region in Belgium (Pham, Ducro, Pihet, & Martin, 2010)

Analyzes

- Comparisons between sexual recidivists, nonsexual recidivists and non-recidivists
 - Age and period at release
 - Scores and levels of risk at Static 99R and 2002R
- Correlations between static variables and types of recidivisms
- Logistic regressions and survival curves of sexual recidivism by static variables, offending profiles and type of release

Method

Results

Description of population

Profiles of sex offenders

- By age of victims
- By relations with victims
 - Intrafamilial: sexual offences committed in the family circle
 - Extrafamilial: sexual offences committed outside the family circle, including known and unknown victims
- By intrafamilial relations with victims
 - Incest: sexual offences committed by a first degree relative (eg. father)
 - Pseudo-incest: including biological (except first degree relative) and non-biological incest (eg. stepfather, grandfather, uncle...)

Description of population

Types of release

- End of sentence: sex offenders who max out their sentence
- Release: release before the end of sentence:
- Full parole: persons sentenced to more than 3 years' imprisonment may claim to fulfill a part of it outside the prison under a variety of conditions
- Probation: same type of release as full parole for justiciables sentenced to less than 3 years' imprisonment
- Release of internees: specific type of release for persons who committed an offense and suffering from a mental disorder including during the sentence
- **Other:** prison short leave, electronic monitoring, preventive detention...

- Score at Static-99R (N = 309): M = 2,05; σ = 2,29; R = -3 8
- Score at Static-2002R (N = 308): M = 3,35; σ = 2,50; R = -2 11

Sexual recidivists are younger; experience a shorter period of release, live fewer cohabitation; present more deviant sexual interests (unrelated, stranger, young and male victims), more and frequent prior sex offences

Sexual recidivists present more deviant sexual interest (unrelated, young or male persons) and commit more sex offences (non-contact)

Non-sexual recidivists experience a shorter period of release; present more violent offences (non-sexual) and problems with the Criminal Justice System

Results

Conclusion

- Sexual recidivists present more:
 - Sexual deviant interests: unrelated, stranger, young and male persones
 - Prior sexual offences
- Lots of risk factors described by the literature are weakly related to:
 - General (.12 .25), sexual (.12 .16) and nonviolent nonsexual (.11 .25) recidivisms
- Likely predictors of sexual recidivism are:
 - Age at release
 - Prior sexual offences
 - Deviant sexual interest (non-contact offences, male victims)
- Sex offenders re-offend sexually more quickly and continuously when they are younger, extrafamilial or intra- and extrafamilial ; present less significant cohabitation, higher rates of prior general or sexual offences and are released in another way (prison leave, electronic monitoring, etc.)

Important implications in therapeutic treatment and more broadly supervision

Discussion

Limits

- Low sample size in comparison to international research
- Lack of details on characteristics of sexual offences (eg.: rape, molestation, public outrage,...)

Perspectives

- To conduct regression and survival analysis on general, violent (non-sexual) and non-sexual non-violent recidivisms
- To explore the variability of recidivism rates, scores and risk factors:
 - Types of offenders
 - Types of release
- To explore "dynamic" variables
- To analyze Propensity Matching Scores (PMS) with a higher sample size
